






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#### **From the Patriot District Chair**









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#### **From the District Commissioner**

Why be a Scout leader?





they also instill in them the values of teamwork, leadership, and service. Scout leaders help shape the future leaders of our society by giving them opportunities to challenge themselves, explore new horizons, and make a positive difference in their communities. Scout leaders are not just mentors, they are also friends, role models, and sometimes even superheroes. By doing so, Scout leaders prepare young people to become the future leaders of our society, who can face challenges, solve problems, and inspire others.

That sounds about right, and does more than simply repeat the Mission, Aims and Methods of Scouting. We DO make a difference in the future of our society! But I didn't write that paragraph. After attending the course From Campfire to Coding: Harnessing the Power of AI for Scout Leaders at University of Scouting, I asked ChatGPT what Scout leaders do to make a difference. And that's what came back in a few seconds.

Why do I tell you this? Because just like artificial intelligence will change many aspects of our lives, change is going to continue to happen in Scouting – and not just getting generative AI to write your Scoutmaster Minutes! I briefly want to highlight two areas of change that you need to be aware of:

- 1. **Reimagined Cub Scout Program:** By now most Cub leaders should be aware that the biggest change to that program in many years is coming on June 1. I won't repeat the specifics, but the changes should make the program a more logical progression that is easier for den and pack leaders to put on. It will be more engaging and relevant to Cub Scouts. And it will prepare them better for the transition to even bigger adventures in Scouts BSA.
- 2. National Capital Area District Improvement and Realignment: This one comes from the NCAC Strategic Plan. NCAC is tweaking how Districts and Service Areas are run to manage the Scouting program more effectively and to better foster growth. As of this writing the details of the proposal aren't completely finalized, but we anticipate enjoying synergies from better coordination throughout Fairfax and Northern Virginia, as well as having some neighboring units in adjacent high school sending districts join our District. We hope to have some details to share by our March 14 Roundtable.

Change is not always easy. But I'm confident that the changes coming to Scouting, from better technology to improved programs and support, will be the good kind of change that will allow us to continue to prepare the young people of our community to become the future leaders of society.







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#### **Scouter Interview Tom Tyra**

Tom Tyra is currently the Patriot District Advancement and Eagle Committee Chair: He has been active in the Patriot District for over twenty years which includes five years in his current role on the Patriot District Committee, ten years as a unit leader and merit badge counselor in a Troop, and five years on a Pack Committee. He completed Wood Badge training in 2008. As a Crew Advisor Tom trekked with scouts to Philmont, twice to Northern Tier in Canada and to Sea Base for sailing in the Bahamas.

Outside of Scouting, he enjoys section-hiking in the Shenandoah National Park with only an occasional glamping excursion. He starts each day with an hour in the Pentagon Athletic Center and has spent more than ten years rolling around on a mat at South Run Recreation Center. He has traveled across four continents and is aiming for at least one more.

He and his wife have two grown children who reside in the area. He is trying to teach their cat the difference in wakeup times on weekends with very little success.

Patrick Ring (PR): How and when did you first become involved in Scouting?

Tom Tyra (TT): I joined Cub Scouts in the second grade when a classmate invited me. Back then you had to be eight years old to join the program. I progressed through the ranks, Order of the Arrow, Philmont in 1976, summer camp counselor and then earning Eagle in 1977 and Assistant Scoutmaster all while living in Miami in the South Florida Council.

**PR:** How did you become the Patriot District Advancement and Eagle Committee Chair? **TT:** After serving as a Scoutmaster, I wanted to continue being involved with the scouting program. I saw that the Advancement and Eagle Committee Chair was vacant. I believed this position was a natural fit for me given my experiences working with the older Scouts.

**PR:** Please give us an overview of your duties as the District Advancement and Eagle Committee Chair.

TT: Most of my time is spent approving Eagle Project Proposals, pre-verifying the Eagle Scout Rank Application and then representing the Council at Eagle Boards of Review (EBOR). Many of our volunteers have retired so I cover about half the Troops and Crews in the district and am assisted by District Eagle Representatives (DER). We can certainly use more DERs so if you are interested in making a difference drop me a note. Of course, I answer advancement questions from Scouters in the district.

### PR: Have you experienced any surprises in this role on the Patriot District Committee?

TT: I've been surprised by the number of Scouts who are earning Eagle. I held 11 EBORs in December. There were requests for a few more, however I ran out of time that month and moved them to January. I've also been surprised by the amount of effort needed to make the program work. This effort is mostly transparent to the Scouts, Scouters and families at the Pack, Troop, and Crew level. I was also surprised at the amount of record keeping that needs to be verified and that automation has not made it easier.



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Another surprise was finding out that EBORs can be held anywhere. During COIVID19 period requiring social distancing, I held an EBOR under a pavilion with snow on the ground at Camp Snyder. Another time, I ran an EBOR at a campout under a tarp in the rain. Most of the time though, EBORs are held at a dining room table or at a community center.

**PR:** What advice would you pass along to your successor?

**TT:** First, I would say have fun with the position because that will rub off on the scouts. Second, this position is very different from being a Scoutmaster. As a Scoutmaster you invest a tiny bit of influence on a Scout every week for years. As a District Eagle Representative, you have less than two hours with a Scout and then will likely never see them again. So, this position requires taking a long view in seeing how your efforts are building a better tomorrow by bringing on board another Eagle Scout.

**PR:** How is the Patriot District performing in the advancement domain?

**TT:** In 2023 Patriot District had over 260 Scouts earn the Arrow of Light and 76 Scouts earn Eagle Scout. They also earned thousands of merit badges. We have a very busy district with a lot of opportunities, especially given our relatively small size.

**PR:** Is there anything else you would like to share with fellow Patriot District Scouters? **TT:** I would like to thank everyone for their contributions in delivering the program. I think Scouts BSA is increasingly delivering on the motto: **Prepared For Life.**

### ANNOUNCING A NEW OPPORTUNITY TO BE TRAINED in Youth Mental Health First Aid

If a scout in your unit were to die by suicide – you would be devastated. No doubt you would vow to do everything in your power to stop such an event from ever happening in your, or another, unit ever again. The time to make that vow is **NOW** - before something happens!!

As we are all painfully aware, mental health issues including depression, feelings of helplessness and loneliness, being bullied and thoughts of suicide are no stranger to the youth we support and were exacerbated by the recent pandemic. As adult volunteer Scout leaders it is incumbent upon us to know how to recognize and respond to the signs of mental illness and duress. This knowledge can literally be the difference between life and death. *Please* learn how you can help!!

An in-person class will be held on **20 April from 8am-5pm.** The location will be the Holy Spirit School (8802 Braddock Rd, Annandale, VA). As of right now, there is no cost for the training as the county has received a grant for this course, but a \$5 contribution to offset the cost of snacks, water, and coffee is appreciated.

#### **Camp Snyder Registration for Summer 2024**

Camp Snyder has multiple Cub Scout options and Scouts BSA options. Many details can be found at gotosnyder.org.

**Cub Scout Day Camp**: Come experience all the fun that Camp has to offer five days a week. This camp experience runs from 9:00 AM – 4:00 PM each day and includes all your summer camp favorites. Lunch each day is included in the cost of camp for Scouts and their adult chaperone.

**Cub Scout Weekend Overnight Camp**: Sleep in a tent, eat in the dining hall, enjoy lots of great activities, and experience a great campfire program. The fun is non-stop from morning until night. Sessions run from Thursday at 6:30 PM to Sunday at 9:00 AM and feature three nights of overnight camping. Meals are provided from Friday breakfast through Sunday continental breakfast.

**Scouts BSA Merit Badge Camp (Two Weeks in 2024!):** There are two attendance options in 2024: (1) stay at Camp Snyder from Sunday – Saturday, complete your merit badges, and enjoy a series of fun evening activities, or (2) choose to attend from 9-5 Monday-Friday as a day-only participant for the merit badges class and rank advancement sessions.



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# Wildness and Remote First Aid (WRFA) Classes Scheduled through the Spring

This valuable training is required for at least one adult leader on each BSA High Adventure, including Goshen's Lenhok'sin Trek or Canoe Adventure. There are spaces available, for the Spring Wilderness and Remote First Aid training at Camp Snyder, but they fill up fast. Dates for this Spring are **March 23-24, April 27-28, and May 11 – 12**. This very informative course provides a two-year Red Cross certification in WRFA and Adult and Pediatric First Aid, CPR and AED. It is open to all registered adults and youth at least 15 years old. #### **Short-Term Camp Administrator Training**

All District and Council overnight events of no more than three days are required to meet National standards (NCAP) for Short-term Camping. A Short-term Camp Administrator STCA) must certify that the event meets minimum standards, primarily for health and safety and BSA policy concerns. An STCA also works with the event director in the planning stages to avoid unpleasant surprises. Patriot District had a number of trained Volunteers but **we need more** to ensure the success of our events. Requirements to fill this position are: a) to be a registered adult at least 21 years of age and b) be certified as an STCA. 2024 training dates for this certification, which lasts two years, have been published. Upcoming first timer and recertification training sessions:



- March 23rd, 2024 -10 AM Eastern Time
- April 20th, 2024 10 AM Eastern Time
- May 18th, 2024 10 AM Eastern Time


The High Adventure committee advises that **Philmont is not full for 2024**. If you are not particular about which trek you want, several openings still remain for treks this summer.

#### **Patriot Training Corner**

There is a lot of good training coming up, including several Cub Scout Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO) and Scout BSA Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills (IOLS) sessions this spring (see table below). At least one BALOO trained leader is required to take Cub Scouts camping and a best practice is to have at least two or three on every Pack, Webelos or AOL camping trip. IOLS is required for a Scouts BSA adult leader to be considered "Trained." In addition to the courses listed below, many Scouts BSA summer camps offer IOLS while the scouts are in merit badge classes, so if you plan to attend a camp as a chaperone, check and see if it is available. They do plan to offer IOLS at each session at Goshen.

Speaking of Goshen, if you are interested in helping to teach IOLS at Goshen, or teaching parts of IOLS or BALOO within Patriot District, please let me know.


#### Original Robert Baden Powell 9 Point Scout Law

The original 1908 Baden-Powell's Scout Law was defined as: A Scout is...Trustworthy, Loyal, Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind, Obedient, Cheerful, and Thrifty.

The first publication of 'Scouting for Boys' in 1908 Baden-Powell first proposed only the first 9 points of the Scout Law. When Seton started working on the "Boy Scouts of America Official Handbook" he collaborated with Baden-Powell on the Scout Law for the book. The original Baden-Powell 9 points of Scout Law was printed in the 1910 first edition. The 12 points of the BSA's Scout Law was put together by Robert Baden-Powell and Ernest Seton for the "second edition" published the following year. Using some inspiration from Seton's Woodcraft. The Ernest Seton 1910 Woodcraft Indian Law was defined as; Obedience, Courage, Cleanliness, No Smoking, No Fire-Water, Wild-Life, No Wild-Fire, Kindness, Play Fair, Silence, Reverence, and Word of Honor. Baden-Powell & Seton's added 3 points from Woodcraft Indian Law to the BSA's Scout Law in 1911; Seton's Courage became Brave, Cleanliness became **Clean** and Reverence became **Reverent**.

# BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA THE SCOUT LAW 1. A Scout's Honor is to be Trusted. If a scout says "On my honor it is so," that means that it is so, just as if he had taken a most solemn oath. Similarly, if a scout officer says to a scout, "I trust you on your honor to do this," the scout is bound to carry out the order to the very best of his ability, and to let nothing there for suith his did. the order to the very interfere with his doing so. If a scout were to break his honor by telling a lie, or by an order exactly when trusted on his If a scout were to break his honor by telling a lie, or by not carrying out an order exactly when trusted on his honor to do so, he may be directed to hand over his scout badge, and never to wear it again. He may also be directed to cease to be a scout. 2. A Scour is Loval to the President, and to his officers, and to his parents, his country, and his employers. He must stick to them through thick and thin against any one who is their enemy or who even talks badly of them. A Scour's Dury is one blagery. Any THEN OTHERS. is their enemy or who even talks badly of them. 3. A Scour's Duty is to be Useful and to Help Others. And he is to do his duty before anything else, even though he gives up his own pleasure, or comfort, or safety to do it. When in difficulty to know which of two things to do, he must ask himself, "Which is my duty?" that is, "Which is best for other people?"—and do that one. He must Be Prepared at any time to save life, or to help injured persons. And he must try his best to do a good turn to somebody every day. 4. A Scour is A Freind to All, and a Brother to Every Other Scout, no Matter to what Social Class the Other Belongs. Thus if a scout meets another scout, even though a stranger. BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA "Kim," the boy scout, was called by the Hindoos "Little friend of all the world," and that is the name that every scout should earn for himself.

A Scour is Courroots: That is, he is polite to all—but especially to women and children, and old people and invalids, cripples, etc. And he must not take any reward for being helpful or courteous.

A Scour is A Freedow to Animals. He should save them as far as possible from pain, and should not kill any animal unnecessarily, even if it is only a fly—for it is one of God's creatures. Killing an animal for food is allowable. able.

7. A SCOUT OBEYS ORDERS of his parents, patrol leader, or scoutmaster without question.

Even if he gets an order he does not like he must do as soldiers and sailors do, he must carry it out all the same because it is his duty; and after he has done it he can come and state any reasons against it: but he must carry out the order at once. That is discipline.

8. A SCOUT SMILES AND LOOKS PLEASANT under all circumstances. When he gets an order he should obey it cheerily and readily, not in a slow, hang-dog sort of way.

Scouts never grumble at hardships, nor whine at each other, nor swear when put out.

When you just miss a train, or some one treads on your favorite corn—not that a scout ought to have such things as corns—or under any amoying circumstances, you should force yourself to smile at once, and then whistle a time, and you will be all right.

A scout goes about with a smile on. It cheers him and cheers other people, especially in time of danger, for he keeps it up then all the same.
