

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


From the District Chair

Every February Scouts all over the United States do their Duty to God by participating in a Scout commemoration at their place of worship. If your unit is chartered by a religious institution, please reach out and offer a visible presence at a service. Scout Sunday is officially February 5th, and Scout Sabbath and Jumu'ah are February 10th, but this can be done at any time during the month that's convenient and appropriate for the institution. Scouts might usher or collect the offering, do a flag ceremony or set up a display, lead a reading or prayer, give a short speech to thank the chartering organization for its support, or just attend a service in uniform. If your family worships at a place that does not sponsor Scouts, you can also attend in uniform to demonstrate the last point of the Scout Law, "A Scout is Reverent."

NCAC's annual University of Scouting will be held on Saturday, February 25th at Hayfield Secondary School. There are also a limited number of courses available on Zoom for those who cannot attend in-person. Scouter Interview: Bill Snowden

Patrick Ring

Bill Snowden is the longest serving member of the Patriot District Committee, having initially joined the District Committee in the late 1990s. Over a period of more than two decades, he has served as a longtime leader in the annual Friends of Scouting (FOS) campaign, as Activities and Civic Service Chair, Vice Chair for Finance, Vice Chair for Program, and District Deputy Chair. He currently serves as Editor of the Patriot Press, a position he has held for more than five years. His longtime service to Scouting in the Patriot District continues despite his move to the Pacific Northwest in 2019. Bill is a past recipient of the Distinguished Patriot Scouter Award (2009), and he received the Silver Beaver Award in 2015 for his many contributions to the Scouting program in the National Capital Area Council.



Bill is a materials scientist and defense technologist who earned his undergraduate degree in Ceramic Engineering from Alfred University. He subsequently earned M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Materials Science and Engineering from the University of California Berkeley. He has broad industry (Corning Inc., General Electric), national Laboratory (Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory), and government (Department of Defense (DoD)) experience as a research scientist, technical program manager, and executive. For more than 20 years, Bill served as a consultant to DoD organization, particularly the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA). Although he retired in 2018, he remains active in the defense technology arena in a voluntary capacity as a member of the Army Science Board, which conducts studies of high interest and importance to Army military and civilian leadership.

Bill and his wife of more than 50 years, Diane, are the parents of four children: Kristy, Michael, Stacey, and Kelsey. Michael served as Camp Director at Camp Snyder for several years prior to his passing in 2018. Working with Dave Schneeman, Michael was a key driving force for the development of the woodshop at Camp Snyder, which was later named in his memory.

Patrick Ring (PR): How and when did you first become involved in Scouting, and then later come to serve as a member of the Patriot District Committee?

Bill Snowden (BS): I first got involved in Scouting in the late 1980s when my son joined Pack 1346 as a Tiger Cub. He eventually crossed over to Scouts BSA, and I was soon thereafter drafted onto the Troop 1346 Committee. From 1994-1999, I served as Troop Committee Chair. It was in that role that I was first introduced to the annual NCAC Friends of Scouting campaign. I introduced a new approach for soliciting contributions from our Troop families that proved to be so successful that it was maintained for many years. Based on that accomplishment, the District Committee asked me to help with FOS efforts involving all of our Packs and Troops. Once onboard, there are always many things that need to be done and I ended up serving in a number of different positions.

PR: How did all of that experience lead to your eventually becoming editor of the Patriot Press?

BS: While serving as District Deputy Chair in 2016, I began assisting Joe Osborne in preparing the final version of the Patriot Press. I had previously contributed many articles and photographs to the newsletter, particularly involving District camporees and the District Pinewood Derby, so it was an easy transition to becoming the editor. I assumed that role about five years ago after Joe resigned, intending to hold the

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position until someone else would take it on. Bill Dexter asked me to continue serving until his tenure as District Chair ended, and I agreed. I committed to yet one more year of service when Joe Margraf became our District Chair, but this will be my last year. I have enjoyed serving as editor, but I look forward to the opportunity to help a new editor come up-to-speed as my replacement within the next few months.

PR: What has driven you to serve such a long time as a member of the Patriot District Committee?

BS: It's not the high pay and the easy hours! First and foremost, it is because I recognize the great value that the Scouting program provides participating youth: the opportunity to learn many new things, having lots of fun sharing Scouting adventures with friends, contributing in so many ways to character building that will be of great benefit for the rest of their lives, and more. I like being a small part of that. And I have found my interactions with fellow Scouters to be personally rewarding; you meet a lot of good people in Scouting and it's great to have that continuing experience as a member of the team.

PR: Describe any changes in how the Patriot District has functioned over the last several decades.

BS: In many ways, the District Committee functions much as it has since I first joined so long ago. We have been fortunate through most of that time to have effective Chair leaders and a strong and committed group of Scouters supporting the wide range of areas addressed by the Committee.

PR: What are some challenges facing the Patriot District and do you have any suggestions for meeting those challenges.

BS: In recent years we have found it challenging to recruit new members to the Committee, something that is of critical importance if we are to maintain our strong record of support to Scouting activities for our Packs and Troops. We need to be more proactive in recruiting new and active members. For several years I have advocated an "all hands on deck" meeting of committee members, unit leaders, and Pack and Troop committee chairs as a forum for explaining the broad scope of committee functions and the importance of enlisting the help of other knowledgeable and interested Scouters in our work.

PR: What benefits have you received from your experience as a member of the Patriot District Committee.

BS: It's great to be part of an organization like the Boy Scouts of America that does so much to contribute to the growth and long-term well being of our youth. Sharing time outdoors with Scouts and fellow Scouters is also an enjoyable experience that brings lots of great memories. And I have always had a great time working with fellow Scouters on the annual District Pinewood Derby.

PR: What are some of your most memorable experiences as a Scouter?

BS: Anyone with a long Scouting history has a wealth of great memories, including participating in many outdoor activities, Pinewood Derby events, working with Scouts as they advance in rank, and more. But the highlight for me has to be participating in a 93-miles-long 10-day trek at Philmont Scout Ranch in 1995 with my son and other Scouts and leaders. I encourage any Scouter who has the opportunity to have such an experience to take full advantage of it.

PR: Is there anything else you would like to share with fellow Patriot District Scouters?

BS: Scouting is a great way to make a difference in the lives of young people. Enjoy every moment.

Goshen Registration is Now Open

... and popular weeks are filling up fast.

Goshen Scout Reservation is Located about 20 miles West of Lexington, surrounded by the Goshen Wildlife Management Reserve. It offers three Scouts BSA camping/dining options:

- **Camp Marriott:** Heater stack or Patrol Cooking food plans with tent camping.
- Camp Bowman: Patrol Cooking with tent camping.
- Camp Olmsted: Dining Hall with tent and a limited number of Adirondack shelter camping



All camps offer a full program of aquatics, shooting sports, ecology, handicraft/culture-craft and other merit badges. Goshen also has a COPE/Climbing area available to all three BSA camps.

Webelos Camp at Camp Ross offers a full program for Webelos and AOL Scouts.

Lenhok'sin High Adventure (LHA) is a unique, highly rated High Adventure Camp. It offers a backpacking opportunity for crews of up to 12 Scouts who are at least 13 years of age by the beginning of their trek. Crews backpack to outposts located around the reservation, where they participate in the program and spend the night. Each morning they head out to their next outpost. Patriot District Spring Camporee

The Patriot District spring camporee will be held at Camp Manidokan, 1600 Harpers Ferry Road, Knoxville, Maryland on April 14-16. 2023. Troops and Crews are invited to gather in a meadow surrounded by trees where the Shenandoah River meets the Potomac River near Harper's Ferry, West Virginia, for a weekend of fun and outdoor adventure. On Friday night, units will arrive and set up camp. The program on Saturday will be unit-led, with Scouts hiking, biking, canoeing, or using rafts on whitewater to enjoy the beauty of this scenic place in America. Scouts may also visit Historic Harpers Ferry or walk the Civil War Battlefield at Antietam. The camporee staff will offer the American Heritage Merit Badge at the camporee for Scouts that will focus on either Harper's Ferry or Antietam.

Units choose which adventure they want to accomplish. Hiking is incredible in this area. There are numerous trails to explore including hiking parts of the Appalachian Trail, walking along rivers, or exploring historical sites. One famous hike is along the Maryland Heights Trail. Alternatively, units might want to canoe, whitewater raft, tube, or kayak for the day. There are many possible trips with different levels of difficulty Scouts can canoe. Units that are going to Philmont or Northern Tier this summer can include a shakedown or training activity at the camporee.

Each unit that is conducting a water adventure (canoe, whitewater rafting, tubing or kayaking) must conduct a safety program prior to the camporee and submit a Safety Afloat Plan to Bobby Walker, District Executive, for Patriot District at bobby.walker@scouting.org or (434) 429-4112 prior to the Camporee. Bobby Walker will disseminate the Safety Afloat Plan to appropriate persons at Counsel. The River and Trail Company is a major outfitter in the Harper's Ferry vicinity. They regularly support Scouts BSA and Camp Manidokan programs. Besides renting equipment, they also have several buses to provide group transportation. Their Point of Contact is Jenn at 1-888-446-7527. Additionally, there are several other outfitters in the area. All contracts for activities are agreements between individual units and outfitters, and units will directly pay the outfitters for any services.

The Camporee will feagure traditional Camporee activities, inclduing Opening and Closing Ceremonies, Friday night Senior Patrol Leader/Scoutmaster meeting and cracker barrel, Saturday night campfire and religious services.

Scouts BSA and Crews of Patriot and Old Dominion Districts are invited. Troops and Crews from other districts also are invited to the Camporee. Unfortunately, Cub Scout Packs cannot attend due to Scouts BSA rules. For units registering on Black Pug, registration will be opening soon and will be reachable from the NCAC calendar or a link we will send by Wednesday, April 12. When registering by April 12, the cost for the camporee is \$32 for all attending Scouts and adults who are camping overnight. The cost for people registering on Thursday, April 13 or later increases to \$35 per person. There is no cost for adults not camping overnight at Camp Manidkan.

The Point of Contact for the camporee is Pat Ring, who can be contacted by email at pring978@gmail.com or by phone at (703) 674-6178. As soon as units decide to attend the camporee they are asked to notify Pat Ring via email that they are attending with an estimate of how many people will come. Formal registration and payment will then be done on Black Pug. We request you give Pat an estimate early so we can use the numbers for planning purposes.

Pack 1967 Adventure: Have Helicopter, Will Travel

"Fairfax 1, wind is heading at 4.866 knots, runway LRES Ballfield, cleared to land!" On a clear, crisp, and cold Sunday, December 4, the Fairfax County Police Department's (FCPD) Helicopter Division (aka Fairfax 1) "dropped" in for a visit to Laurel Ridge Elementary School's (LRES) ballfield in the Kings Park West neighborhood. What started out as a plan to arrange a visit to Fairfax County's Department of Public Safety Communications, also known as Fairfax County 9-1-1, ultimately resulted in a helicopter landing, takeoff, and on-the-ground tour for Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, siblings, friends, and family.

After an effort to arrange a tour of the 9-1-1 public safety communications center to satisfy several Cub Scout adventures fell through, Pack 1967 decided to pursue a visit to Fairfax 1's headquarters, a hangar located at the Fairfax County government center on Ox Road (part of the I-66 transfer station campus). The hangar however is currently under renovation. Fairfax 1 offered a surprising and accommodating solution, we will come to YOU! From that point on, IT WAS ON to pull out all the stops to successfully plan and organize Fairfax 1's visit.

It all started in September 2022 with a phone call to Fairfax 1's non-emergency number located on their website (https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/police/helicopterdivision/fairfax1). After obtaining a commitment from Fairfax 1 and setting a date, Pack 1967 solicited and received the enthusiastic support of LRES's Principal Megan Counts. A request for facility usage was submitted through FCPS's Community Use website and outreach made to Fairfax County Fire & Rescue to enlist their support to secure the landing zone for the day of the event. After several approvals were received from the various FCPS offices involved in the event, Pack 1967 unexpectedly received a devasting disapproval in November 2022. FCPS denied approval based on their Community Use Fact Sheet Prohibited Activities recently updated in August 2022 that among other things lists "Airplanes/Helicopters/Hot Air Balloons" as being a prohibited event on FCPS property (a copy of the Community Use Fact Sheet Prohibited Activities is located in Basecamp).

In came Principal Counts to the rescue! She immediately engaged the various FCPS offices as well as FCPS Region 4 Superintendent, explaining to all parties the benefit of this community event and that this was in essence a Fairfax County government event: FCPD working in conjunction with FCPS. Principal Counts was successful in convincing FCPS to approve the event. Pack planning for the event never stopped. Pack 1967's former Cubmaster and current Vienna Volunteer Firefighter Matt Jones devised an Incident Action Plan – Incident Name: Emergency Response Showcase to Laurel Ridge Elementary School Cub Scouts and Girl Scouts; Objective: Provide an opportunity to the youth participants to view, tour, and learn about the various units and emergency personnel. It outlined primary operations, participants of approximately 150 youth plus parents, special considerations, resources, points of contact, and identified the landing zone for Fairfax 1, the Burke Volunteer Fire Department (BVFD), and Pack 1967. Cubmaster Matt Cursio developed a meticulous schedule to accommodate the large number of participants between Fairfax 1 and several BVFD emergency vehicles to ensure everyone was gainfully occupied and had an opportunity to tour the helicopter.

In keeping with the Scout Law principles of being helpful, friendly, and courteous, Pack 1967 exercised its civic duty to inform the neighborhood of Fairfax 1's impending visit. Afterall, anyone who lives in Fairfax County is no stranger to low-flying helicopters and accompanying noise. Scouts distributed small flyers to homes immediately bordering the LRES ballfield and sent Facebook messages alerting the community of Fairfax 1's non-emergency landing.

On the day of the event, the excitement was palpable. All in attendance were bundled up and anxious. At approximately 2:15 PM, a noticeable thump, thump, thump of a helicopter could be heard. Everyone's excitement level increased and then increased even more when the helicopter came into view. As a matter of procedure, Fairfax 1 circled the LRES ballfield several times before making its approach for landing. And all of sudden, there it was; coming in low over the tree line and majestically landing on the ballfield with a cold gust of wind caused by its powerful downwash (down-directed wind). For the next two hours the Fairfax 1 crew and BVFD firefighters were incredibly gracious and accommodating, giving presentations, answering questions, and ensuring that everyone had the opportunity to tour the helicopter and accompanying vehicles.









When the time came for Fairfax 1 to depart, we all watched with a sense of civic pride and glee as the helicopter started its engines, went through its pre-flight checks, and gently raised above the ballfield. In an instant it was gone. However, the impressions made that day will last a lifetime.





GET BCOLS TRAINED!

This course was developed by a group of Scouters in 1993; it has been continually updated to meet current techniques and technology. It is aimed at all adults working with older youth regardless of program (Boy Scouting, Venturing, or Exploring). This This training IS NOT recommended for Cub Scout leaders or people without camping experience. All participants are strongly encouraged to complete Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills, as well as the position-specific training for their program area (Venturing or, Boy Scout) prior to attending this course. All participants must be able to meet current physical requirements of the BSA Annual Health & Medical Record.

The target audience is adult leaders planning High Adventure treks at backcountry venues not supported by BSA infrastructure; however, units planning to attend High Adventure bases supported by BSA will find this course useful, inasmuch as unit shakedowns will, most likely, take place in venues not supported by BSA infrastructure. If you are participating in an NCAC-sponsored High Adventure Trek, you must also take the course offered by the NCAC High Adventure Committee.

Youth participants (16 and up) will be admitted on an individual basis and requires the nomination by the unit leader. Youth must have completed unit leadership training (Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops or Crews, etc.). National Youth Leadership Training is strongly recommended. Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills is offered by the Council Training Committee as an optional follow-on to the basic course, Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Its goal is to provide adult leaders with an overview of such topics as:

- Trek Planning Leadership Skills Team Development Leave No Trace Water Treatment ●
- Stove Maintenance
 Risk Management
 Equipment Maintenance
 Crew Equipment Needs
 Selection
- Personal Equipment Needs & Selection
 ◆ Terrain Awareness & Land Navigation
 ◆ Menu Planning & Clean-up
 - Hygiene & Health On the Trail Tips Wilderness First Aid Overview

<u>Part 1</u> — Addresses ways to effectively work with older youth and covers the detailed preparation and planning that must be done before you go out, including risk management. Summarizes the personal and crew equipment used for lightweight camping. Plans are also made for the weekend overnight session. (Part 1 is the EXPLAIN & DEMONSTRATE part of EDGE.)

<u>Part 2</u> — Participants will practice core leader skills for the outdoor program — Leave No Trace, navigation (map & compass plus GPS), terrain awareness, expedition menu planning and food preparation, stove and stove maintenance, wilderness first aid issues, expedition health and hygiene, team building. (Part 2 is the GUIDE part of EDGE.)

<u>Part 3</u> — While not required, we strongly suggest participation in the Hikeoree which will allow BCOLS trained leaders to apply the BCOLS training with their youth at a real-world event. (Part 3 is the ENABLE part of EDGE.)

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BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

- 1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all Questions truthfully and honestly.
- 2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16
- 4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
- 5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - · Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
- 6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
- 7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
- 8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
- 9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
- 10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection
