From the District Commissioner

In this month's District Chair column, Joe Margraf does an excellent and colorful job advertising **Program Launch**, **Thursday May 11**, **7:30 PM at St. Stephens UMC on Braddock Road**. I'd like to expand on that a bit and explain *why* Program Launch and good advance program planning matters to the success of your unit for the upcoming Scouting year.

Program Launch is your Pack, Troop, or Crew's opportunity to get information, materials, and tips about Scouting resources, activities and events you can use to enhance your unit's 2023-2024 program. There will be over 20 information tables, electronic links to resources, and paper handouts, as well as lots of people to share ideas with. This will be our largest Program Launch in several years, with many stations full of information about all aspects of the Scouting program. *Let me be blunt:* unless you're really turned on by reinventing wheels from scratch or are content just doing the same-old-same-old every year (hint: your Scouts are NOT), you need to come to Program Launch. Program Launch is the one-stop-shop for you to get important information that will be available to help your unit provide the best possible experience for your Scouts.

Program Planning in advance of the new Scouting year is critical to building the best possible program. All units should plan their program for the upcoming Scouting year before school ends and everyone disperses for the summer. This means our Troop PLCs and Crew Officers should meet this spring to make major decisions about their units' activities from August through at least the end of the next school year. Likewise, our Pack adult leaders should meet to decide on the basic content and timing of major events for the upcoming Scouting year.

Why is it important to do at least high-level planning for the upcoming Scouting year by June? Because if you wait too long to figure out campouts, meeting dates and locations as well as other major activities, all the best venues and dates may be full. Having a well-planned program calendar helps your Scout families with their own planning. It helps with recruiting, because potential members want to learn what each unit they visit will be doing, and prospective families can quickly tell when thorough planning hasn't occurred. Of course, having major events decided well in advance also gives both adult and youth leaders enough time to do further detailed planning to make activities a success. Other useful discussions during a program planning meeting can include leadership succession planning, committee assignments for the next Scouting year, and a review of things the unit would like to do better in delivering the promise of Scouting to its youth members. We strongly recommend using the 2023 Journey to Excellence scorecard as a roadmap for discussing areas for improvement. It's also good to invite your Unit Commissioner to the planning meeting, because our UCs have a wealth of experience and know how to find answers to all your questions.

And as Benjamin Franklin said, "If you fail to plan, you are planning to fail." None of us want to fail our Scouts, so PLEASE come to Program Launch on May 11, and hold a unit annual program planning meeting this spring!

Advancement News

We have a new policy regarding merit badge group instruction in the National Capital Area. Drop me a note with questions and when you need District approval. Thank you for all you do for our Scouts.

This policy shall apply to all Group Merit Badge Instruction events occurring within the geographic boundaries of the NCAC and employing NCAC registered and approved Merit Badge Counselors. All merit badge instruction within the Council must comply with BSA Youth Protection, the Guide to Safe Scouting and the Guide to Advancement.

• A troop, crew or ship can use group instruction of merit badges within their unit without seeking approval from the Council or District.

- Citizenship in Society merit badge counselors may accept Scouts from outside their unit without obtaining district approval if doing so will promote discussion. Consideration should be given to having participating Scouts within 2 years of age.
- With the exception of units sponsored by NCAC, units with the same chartering organization may
 offer group merit badge instruction solely to the members of the linked units. Units sponsored by
 NCAC will need to seek district or council approval to offer group merit badge instruction to
 youth outside their unit.
- If a unit decides to sponsor a merit badge event featuring multiple merit badges and solicits Scouts from outside their unit to participate, or an individual counselor solicits Scouts from multiple units, or the District sponsors such an event, they must get district advancement committee approval to conduct the event. This affords the district advancement committee the opportunity to ensure compliance with the Guide to Advancement guidance on group instruction.
- Council level groups such as Aquatics, Shooting Sports, any religious committee, and STEM
 must get approval from either the Council Advancement Chair, Council Merit Badge Dean, or
 NCAC Advancement Committee Staff Advisor.
- Outside organizations to the BSA must always receive council approval from one of the positions.
- To expedite council/district advancement committee approval of an event, sponsoring organizations should submit, at a minimum, the information described in Appendix A 30 days prior to the event. Districts, with the approval of their Key Three, may request additional information if they choose.

Appendix A

Group Merit Badge Instruction Plan

- 1. Provide the names of participating counselors along with the badges they propose to Council to the District Merit Badge dean. This allows the District to ensure the counselors are currently registered, approved to counsel the badge they propose to Council and have current Youth Protection Training.
- 2. Describe how the sponsoring organization will comply with the Guide to Advancement, BSA Youth Protection and the Guide to Safe Scouting. If there will be co-ed classes, the sponsor should describe how it will comply with BSA requirements in this area.
- 3. Group Merit Badge events providing Aquatics or Shooting Sports merit badges must explain how the event will deal with safety concerns related to these activities.
- 4. Confirm the sponsoring organization informed Scouts, parents, and leaders that an event with limited time frequently results in a partial merit badge.
- 5. The sponsoring organization must tell scouts, parents and leaders how to report concerns about merit badge counseling issues.

Goshen Registration is Now Open

... and popular weeks are filling up fast.

Goshen Scout Reservation is Located about 20 miles West of Lexington, surrounded by the Goshen Wildlife Management Reserve. It offers three Scouts BSA camping/dining options:

- **Camp Marriott:** Heater stack or Patrol Cooking food plans with tent camping.
- Camp Bowman: Patrol Cooking with tent camping.
- Camp Olmsted: Dining Hall with tent and a limited number of Adirondack shelter camping



All camps offer a full program of aquatics, shooting sports, ecology, handicraft/culture-craft and other merit badges. Goshen also has a COPE/Climbing area available to all three BSA camps.

Webelos Camp at Camp Ross offers a full program for Webelos and AOL Scouts.

Lenhok'sin High Adventure (LHA) is a unique, highly rated High Adventure Camp. It offers a backpacking opportunity for crews of up to 12 Scouts who are at least 13 years of age by the beginning of their trek. Crews backpack to outposts located around the reservation, where they participate in the program and spend the night. Each morning they head out to their next outpost. These could include Mountain Man, Mountain Biking, COPE/Climbing, Foxfire, Search and Rescue and others.

Goshen Bus Loading: Each weekend during the Goshen Season, busses arrive and depart from the Fairfax County Government Center in Fairfax, transporting Units to and from Goshen Scout Reservation. Each Saturday, Units arrive back from Goshen at about 10:30 AM and each Sunday units depart for Goshen at about 10:30. The Bus Loading Support Team is looking for OA people to help with

As we are all painfully aware, mental health issues including depression, feelings of helplessness and loneliness, being bullied and thoughts of suicide are no stranger to the youth we support and have been exacerbated by the current pandemic. As adult volunteer Scout leaders it is incumbent upon us to know how to recognize and respond to the signs of mental illness and duress. This knowledge can literally be the difference between life and death. *Please* learn how you can help!!



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BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

- 1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all Questions truthfully and honestly.
- 2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16
- 4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
- 5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
- 6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
- 7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
- 8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
- 9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
- 10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection
