From the District Commissioner

Happy New Year, and I hope everyone's Holidays were both happy and healthy!

Rechartering (hopefully the last mention in my column for many months!)

The online roster confirmation portion of rechartering is complete for all our regular units. I especially want to thank Deputy District Commissioner Lee Cass and the Commissioner corps for once again doing a fantastic job leading the rechartering process. During 2023 the Patriot District added one new unit and lost no incumbent units. We'll be looking to add a few more units, especially Cub Packs, as we continue to return to pre-pandemic strength during 2024. But some of our Packs and Troops are still struggling coming out of the pandemic, and we are going to focus on recruiting and growth in 2024, especially for those units that aren't fully back to pre-pandemic strength. Strong program and strong recruiting lead to dynamic units, and most importantly, provide great experiences for our Scouts.

Now we need to finish getting the **Annual Charter Agreements** signed – make sure you are using the 2023-24 version of the ACA, because older versions cannot be accepted. Please coordinate and run questions through your Unit Commissioner, Lee and/or myself. Note that a single ACA can be used for multiple units chartered by the same organization, provided it's filled out to reflect all the units and necessary signatures.

We are also still looking for 2023 **Journey to Excellence** scorecards from many of our units. Again, please coordinate the JTE forms with your Unit Commissioner, Lee or myself. Remember, JTE can and should be used as a planning tool to make your unit's program even better for 2024, not as a backward-looking "report card."

University of Scouting

NCAC's annual University of Scouting will be held on Feb. 24 at Hayfield Secondary School. This is a fantastic full-day live training event for all Scout leaders with hundreds of courses to choose from that cover literally every aspect of Scouting. Every unit should get as many leaders as possible to attend. Online registration and the course catalog are available here. Don't just focus on courses in the "college" for your program level - look at courses in all parts of the catalog to make sure you're not missing something of interest. For example, Cub Scout and Scouts BSA Shooting Sports courses are listed in the College of Adventure Scouting, and courses on food allergy mitigation and youth mental health that are of vital importance to all are in the College of General Studies.

On January 6, the National Capital Area Council held the annual Amangamek-Wipit Lodge Order of the Arrow Banquet at the University of Maryland. Four Patriot District Scouters were honored as having attained Vigil status in the OA during 2023, including District Committee member Justin Day, former District Chair Bill Dexter, District Commissioner Ken Gaul, and Assistant District Commissioner

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Scouter Interview: Richard Chandler



Rick Chandler is currently the Patriot District Training Chair and Committee Chair for Pack 873. He was a Cub Scout as a youth, earning his AOL. While he only completed about two years of Boy Scouts, summer camp at Camp Sabattis in the Adirondack Mountains left an indelible mark.

Patrick Ring (PR): How and when did you first become involved in Scouting?

Richard Chandler (RC): I started as an adult leader seven years ago when my oldest started first grade. There were two of us that signed our sons up at first, so I became the Assistant Den Leader. Over the next five years I became the pack Treasurer and then Committee Chair. After my oldest bridged to Scouts BSA, I became a Den Leader again for my youngest's Lion Den. Luckily, several of the other dads in the den are Eagle Scouts and have stepped up into leadership

roles, allowing me to focus on the Committee and District.

PR: What can you tell us about the state of training within the Patriot District?

RC: About 2/3 of our leaders are trained, which is good, but when you back out district and reserve positions, less than half of our unit leaders are considered trained. The largest group of "Untrained" direct contact leaders are Assistant Scoutmasters (60%), which is likely to grow given the new BSA rules on adults who can attend Scout BSA campouts. About 50% of Den Leaders and Assistant Den Leaders are "Untrained." Surprisingly, 30% of our Scoutmasters are "Untrained." For Cub Scout leaders to be considered trained they must take their Position Specific Training (PST) on-line or in-person. For Scouts BSA leaders to be considered trained they must take their PST and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills (IOLS). All leaders must also take Youth Protection and Hazardous Weather Training every two years.

PR: Please give us an overview of your duties as the Training Chair.

RC: As the Training Chair, it is my duty to share my knowledge, help district youth and adults get the training they need, and process training awards. Patriot District has long been a leader at putting on some of the best raining and programs within the Council. I plan to continue that tradition by working with other districts to ensure that there are plenty of training opportunities across Northern Virginia.

PR: Speaking of that, wasn't coordinating with other districts part of your recent Wood Badge ticket?

RC: Yes, I recently finished Wood Badge and the primary focus of my project was to strengthen the Patriot Training program and better coordinate across the districts. I was frustrated that almost every year there would be multiple BALOO and/or IOLS programs offered on the same weekends, often at the same location. Leaders would complain that they wanted to take the courses, but the limited offerings conflicted with their schedules, especially unit campouts. The culmination of my ticket was to coordinate with the other Virginia Central districts to better coordinate training. I'm happy to say that 11 of the 12 districts in the Virginia Central and South Areas have joined us. This past fall collectively we offered 3 BALOO and 4 IOLS courses (none overlapping) and have already planned a similar number this spring and next fall.

PR: As the District Training Chair what would you say to people apprehensive about Wood Badge?





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RC: That it's not some type of capstone or PHD program for lifelong scouters. As someone who has been to a lot of leadership training over the past 20+ years as a federal leader, Wood Badge incorporates many of the best elements of these programs and applies them to the scouting program. Despite seven years as a scout leader, I learned a lot about Scouts BSA and Venturing, and practical ways to improve my leadership of youth and adult volunteers. Just like every other BSA training course I have ever taken, I would say two things: 1) I learned as much from the other participants in the program as I did from the course material, and 2) I should have taken it sooner. There is no perfect time to take Wood Badge, except the next session.

PR: Where do you see the training program headed?

RC: A couple of years ago, NCAC set a goal of having 100% of adult leaders trained. I think they planned to make this a requirement, but eased up on it until after the bankruptcy was resolved and the impact of COVID receded. Now that these are happening, I think Council will push for this to happen, starting with Cubmasters and Scoutmasters, followed by other direct contact leaders, such as Den Leaders and Assistant Scoutmasters. I think there will also be more of a push to attend live training instead of the web-based courses. I think there is a lot of value in personal interaction and sharing lessons learned and best practices from other students and instructors. You'll notice that I said live training instead of in-person. I think in-person is great and the preferred option, but there are some courses, such as Positions Specific Training, that I have offered to small groups via Zoom that has been almost as effective. Via this medium, I was able to break up the class into several evening sessions that people could do from home after dinner and kids went to bed. I was also able to share real world examples in Scoutbook and the participants were able to share best practices with each other.

PR: Is there anything else you would like to share with fellow Patriot District Scouters?

RC: Remember that much of the training you take is not for yourself but for the youth and parents you serve. Just because you were an Eagle Scout doesn't mean that you know everything these courses will teach you. For example, the camping equipment section of BALOO training may not be for you, but the the training reminds you to share your camping knowledge with inexperienced parents. I think most of our "Untrained" leaders think they know the program because they were scouts as youth, but there is still a lot they can learn. Finally, if you are a Committee Chair, Cubmaster, or Scoutmaster: know who is and isn't trained in your unit and encourage them to reach out to me to help them get trained. I'm here to help.

Our Cub Scouts earned over 888 rank advancements including more than 128 Arrow of Light awards.





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BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

- 1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all Questions truthfully and honestly.
- 2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: <u>www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16</u>
- 4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
- 5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
- 6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
- 7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
- 8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
- 9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
- 10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection
