The Patriot District Year in Review

What a GREAT year we had in the Patriot District! Here are a few highlights:

Membership: The Patriot District currently has 2002 Scouts, and membership is rising. Our membership is the second highest in the VA Central Service Area and fifth highest in the Council. Of our 2002 Scouts, we have the following breakdown:

- 956 Cub Scouts
- 1007 Scouts-BSA (Troops)
- 39 Older youth (Venturing)

Schools: Of 18 public and private elementary schools within our District, we have units in 16 of these schools, which is the second highest in the Council.

Units: We added one new unit in 2023.

Advancement: Patriot District had (to date) 262 Arrow of Light Scouts (AOLs) and 63 Eagle Scouts.

Day Camp: Patriot District has the largest Day Camp in the Council for 2023, with 135 Scouts.

Program: We have some of the best district programming in the NCAC:

- Camporees

Hail and Farewell

Reflections on Three Decades of Scouting in the National Capital Area Council and the Patriot District



After more than three decades of Scouting in the NCAC and the Patriot District, the time has come for me to step aside and explore other activities in my remaining retirement years. As a longtime member of the Patriot District Committee, I have held a number of Committee positions over the years, including as Vice Chair for Program, Vice Chair for Finance, and Deputy Committee Chair. And for the last five or six years, I have served as editor of the Patriot Press, even after moving far away to the Pacific Northwest in 2019. I have enjoyed that role very much, but with this issue I am relinquishing that responsibility: this December issue is my last as editor. Beginning in January, the editor will be Jill Brannam, who also serves as District Vice Chair for Communications.

I first became involved in Scouting in the early 1990s when my son, Michael, became a Cub Scout in Pack 1346. He subsequently joined Troop1346, where I came to serve as Troop Committee Chair for five years. In 1999, I joined the District Committee as it was morphing from being the George Washington District to the Patriot District. My initial committee involvement focused on the annual NCAC Friends of Scouting fundraising effort, and I ended up having a leading role in FOS campaigns for the next 18 years, where due to the generosity of District Scouting families, we never failed to meet our NCAC goal. The principal reasons for my long commitment to Scouting: I recognize the great value of the program in supporting the development of our youth, and as I have noted before, one meets a lot of good people in this organization.

Personal interactions with so many good people have been a major highlight of my Scouting career, starting with Troop 1346 leadership in the 1990s, most notably Dan Hurley, who recruited me for what became a 25-year tenure with the Patriot District Committee. Over that extended period, it has been a great pleasure working with so many great Scouters, including Committee Chairs, District Commissioners, and District Executives. Many of these individuals come quicky to mind, but I note that my memory is as good as it was when I was younger, it's just shorter now:

- Committee Chairs: Dan Hurley, Tony Ryan, Joe Flaig (a great hiker), Aasgier and Catherine Gangsaas, Jack Campbell, Steve Smith, Bill Dexter, and Joe Margraf
- District Commissioners: Craig Pettibone. Tony Ryan, Jae Engelbrecht, Dave Astle, and Ken Gaul
- District Executives: Steve McEwan, Peter Johnson, Gary Carroll, Sarah, McKee, Bobby Walker

But my experiences and fond remembrances across the last several decades also include great interactions with countless Pack and Troop leaders for virtually every unit in our District, as well as those with whom I worked in organizing and conducting the District Pinewood Derby for so many years: Pete Griffiths, MCs Joe Margraf and Andy Chavez, Greg Wagner, Steve Smith, Bill Dexter, Joe Casey, and Lee Cass.

Beyond all of these positive and productive Scouting interactions over the years, there are many other memorable experiences to highlight: a 1995 Philmont trek with Michael, working with Bill Dexter on so many great camporees; the many successful FOS campaigns; becoming a Silver Beaver awardee; the fun times at many Pinewood Derby events; helping out on various occasions at Camp Snyder, most notably in assisting in the startup of Michael's Woodshop; and many more. I will remember them always.

As I move on, I wish all Scouts and Scouters in the Patriot District only the best in what lies ahead. With continuing strong leadership, I am confident that the District will continue to prosper long into the future.

Advancement News

Advancement Updates 2024

As of January 1, 2024, the following changes to Scouts BSA requirements become effective:

Rank Requirements:

- There were minor changes to Scout (6), and Star (6).
- The Cyberchip has been phased out. Scouts should use the Personal Safety Awareness training at https://www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/scouts-bsa/ for both Scout and Star ranks.

Eagle Palms:

• Scouts BSA will no longer have to wait three months between Eagle Palms. They will have to earn five additional merit badges and live by the Scout Oath and Law.

Merit badges marked with an asterisk (*) are required for achieving Eagle Scout rank. Overall current merit badge requirements are found at https://www.scouting.org/skills/merit-badges/

The Guide to Advancement Section 7.0.4.3 addresses what to do when merit badge requirements change, and Section 4.0.0.1 addresses changes to rank requirements. This information can be found at https://filestore.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/33088.pdf

There are detailed instructions for specific circumstances relevant to merit badges. In short, though: Once new or revised requirements appear, any Scout beginning work on a merit badge must use the requirement. If they have already begun work they may continue using the old requirements, or they may switch to using the new requirements.

For rank advancement: Once new or revised requirements appear, any Cub Scout, Scouts BSA member, Venturer, or Sea Scout beginning work on the next rank (or Eagle Palm) must use the new or revised requirement as stated there. If they have already begun work they may continue using the old requirements, or they may switch to and begin using the new requirements.





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BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

- 1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all Questions truthfully and honestly.
- 2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16
- 4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
- 5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
- 6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
- 7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
- 8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
- 9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
- 10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection
