ARE YOUR 18-YEAR-OLDS PROPERLY REGISTERED?

From the Registration Guidebook of the Boy Scouts of America

Individuals 18 years of age or older who are participating in a youth program must complete the official adult application, including the CBC authorization form, and must complete Youth Protection training.

For youth protection, when your scouts or Venturers turn 18, they must submit an adult application to continue participating in the unit. For scouts in troops, this would normally mean registering either as an Assistant Scoutmaster or College Scouter Reserve. In a Venturing Crew, the position would be Venturing Participant.

To change the registration in the same unit, a paper registration is needed. The registration should be submitted immediately upon the 18th birthday, but units can plan ahead and ask for the form in advance.

If you have youth who are going to recharter with the unit this fall, and are going to be 18 – and are headed to college or elsewhere – you may want to ask for the form now, and then submit it at the birthday.

From the District Commissioner

Welcome Back to a New Scouting Year!

By the time you read this, our Scouts will be back from their summer camp adventures and getting ready for the upcoming school year. Whether they're looking forward to or dreading their return to school, hopefully all are looking forward to another year of fun and adventure in Scouting!

We'll be kicking off our 2023-2024 monthly **Roundtable** leader training and fellowship sessions on **August 10 at 7:30 pm at St. Stephens United Methodist Church** on Braddock Road. I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at Roundtable, either in-person or virtually!

It's Recruiting Season!

Our August Roundtable will include a discussion of fall recruiting, including a review of the technology-based resources available to reach prospective Scouts at all program levels.

Packs: Our Packs need to begin fall recruiting activities **this month**. We'll be talking about Pack recruiting techniques at Roundtable. Also remember that our third annual **Patriot District Cub-o-Ree at Camp Snyder is on September. 9**. Have your Cubs attend for a day of fun, and *have them bring a friend who's not in Scouting*. That way the Cub-o-Ree instantly becomes a low-effort – but very effective – recruiting event where we can show everyone how much fun Scouting can be.

Troops: Fall recruiting is also relevant to Scouts BSA – current Scouts moved to the area over the summer and want to join a Troop, and there are other youth who are looking for new activities like Scouting. You and your Scouts should be reaching out to these audiences right now. And keep in mind that supporting recruiting at feeder Packs is critical to having a good pool of prospective Scouts for your Troop in a few years. Without strong Packs, Troops can't remain strong for very long. Offer Den Chiefs to area Packs. Ask how your Troop can help with Pack recruiting events and other activities. The payoff from a little help will greatly exceed the effort, and gives your Scouts both leadership opportunities and a chance to know they're making a difference.

BSA Registration Fee and Participation Fee Changes

As most of you know, there are big changes to the BSA registration process, as well as a new Council participation fee. At Roundtable we will review the changes, how they will (and will not) affect rechartering, and answer questions. We will do a full recharter training program at our September 14 Roundtable.

Let's start the Scouting Year Strong!

As leaders we all sometimes need to "recharge our Scouting batteries" and renew our enthusiasm for the program. Starting the new Scouting year strong is a tremendous way to give yourself a boost as a Scout leader, and to remind yourself why what we do as Scouters is so important!

Important Camping Rules Change

The Guide to Safe Scouting has new restrictions, effective September 1, 2023, that will affect how many units conduct campouts. The change is intended to help ensure BSA's Barriers to Abuse more effectively protect our youth members. All Crews, Troops, and Packs should be familiar with the new rules and plan ahead for camping events taking place after September 1, 2023.



- ➤ All adults staying overnight in connection with a Scouting activity must be currently registered in an adult fee-required position as listed or as an adult program participant. *Limited exception below for Cub Scout overnight programs*.
- Cub Scout parents or legal guardians taking part in an overnight Cub Scout program with their own child or legal ward are not required to register as leaders... In addition, the parent or legal guardian must be accompanied by a registered leader at any time they are with youth members other than their own child/ward. All other overnight adults must be currently registered in an adult fee required position.

Some key terms in the restrictions are italicized; "adult fee required position" means a registered BSA adult position with paid registration, and that is subject to a mandatory criminal background check as part of the registration process. Adults registered only as Merit Badge Counselors are *not* currently considered to be in an eligible position.

In the Cub program, only unregistered "parents or legal guardians" may camp overnight. Not other adult relatives like grandparents or uncles. And parents/guardians are only to accompany their own children; no more "sharing" a parent by Cubs from different families. All other camping adults must be registered in a paid position.

2023 Cub Scout Summer Day Camp

This year's theme was OFF TO THE RACES and over 140 Cub Scouts and 30 Cub Leaders went on a five-day High-Speed Adventure where they raced to Archery, Sling Shots, S.T.E.M., Nature, Climbing Wall, Arts & Crafts, Field Games, Stomp Rockets and FUN.

On the first Day of Camp, the Scouts were visited by the Wheaton High School Society of Women Engineers, who are the current World Electric Vehicle Grand Prix Champions. This famous all-girl electric vehicle grand prix team even brought the electric car that won. All the Scouts were able to sit in the car and asked many questions of the team.

National adjusted fees effective 1 August 2023

Annual Membership Fee Update

Effective **August 1, 2023**, the BSA will implement the following national membership fees which were approved by the National Executive Committee:

- \$80 for Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouting participants (\$5 increase)
- \$60 for all adult volunteers (\$15 increase to provide general liability insurance and enhanced background checks)
- \$25 one-time joining fee for new program participants in Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouting (Not prorated and no change in fee)
- \$30 for Scoutreach (Not prorated)
- \$25 for Merit Badge Counselors (New Fee applies only for Merit Badge Counselors not already registered as leaders)
- \$50 for Exploring participants Youth & Adult (\$5 increase)
- \$100 for a unit charter/affiliation fee (no change in fee)
- \$15 for Scout Life magazine

The NCAC Participation fee of \$80 is effective 1 January 2024.

A Scout joining between August 1, 2023, and December 31, 2023 pays the national fee of \$80 (+\$25 if new to Scouting) but does not pay the NCAC participation fee, either at that time, or with 2023 unit renewal. That youth will be listed as pre-paid, and \$0 at unit renewal. The NCAC participation fee will be collected upon a new youth member's annual renewal in 2024, which will occur sometime between August 1, 2024 and December 31. 2024.

Youth in the unit who renew during the annual 2023 unit renewal (re-charter), pay \$80 National fee and \$80 NCAC Participation fee (+ \$15 if they get Scout Life)

Adults pay \$60 National fee and no NCAC Participation fee.

NCAC insurance is included in the Participation Fee and there is no additional charge.

New Merit Badge Counselors (MBC) who register after 1 August 2023 pay \$25 National Fee when MBC is their only registration. MBCs currently registered will pay \$25 when the district renews effective 30 Jan 2024. Adults registered in units who paid the \$60 National fee and are MBCs do not pay for their MBC position; that is a no fee multiple registration.

Effective September 1, 2023, all adults staying overnight in connection with a Scouting activity must be currently registered as an adult volunteer. Adult volunteers must register in the position(s) they are serving in. Registration as a merit badge counselor position does not meet this requirement. Adults registering in a unit may register as a leader, assistant leader, charter representative, committee chair, pack trainer, new member coordinator, member of the committee, or unit Scouter Reserve.

Advancement News

I hope that your summer is going your way. Summer usually presents a surge in advancement opportunities with school out, camps open. and more free time than usual.

Eagle Scout packets are currently being updated to reflect the signature of the new National Chair Brad Tilden. As a result, packet shipments for councils with recipients certified after June 14, 2023, are currently on hold until all signature changes (Certificates and Wallet Cards) are completed. Packets are currently scheduled to resume normal shipments soon and will feature the new National Chair's signature.

New policy: Effective August 15, 2023, in addition to the above five requirements for a group merit badge instruction plan, group merit badge events that are offered to Scouts from more than one district by a unit or an organization that not have a current letter of agreement with NCAC and where the sponsor charges more than \$25.00 per person for the event, must adhere to the following:

- ➤ The sponsor must obtain approval in advance from the Council Advancement Chair, Merit Badge Dean or Council Staff Advisor, like a Council level group.
- ➤ The sponsor must have submitted a budget using the NCAC-mandated form and had the budget approved by a professional NCAC Scouter.
- The sponsor must use NCAC's Black Pug registration site to register participants and all fees must be collected in advance via credit card.
- > For reimbursement, sponsors will need to submit receipts to a professional NCAC Scouter for approval.

If you are aware of an extension request for time to earn Eagle in Patriot district please drop me a note. I would like to crosswalk with NCAC's understanding.

Look for a Patriot district Life-to-Eagle on-line seminar in the October-November timeframe.

Enjoy the last few weeks of summer and I'll see you in the fall.

Scouting for Food – 2023

"Help other people at all times...Do a Good Turn..."









Every state and county in the United States is home to people experiencing food insecurity, defined by the nonprofit Feeding America as "a lack of consistent access to enough food for every person in a household to live an active, healthy life." Fairfax County is no exception, with nearly 75,000 county residents experiencing food insecurity. Food insecurity affects our most vulnerable populations – women, infants, and children.

The way Scouts BSA/Boy Scouts of America supports those with food insecurity in Fairfax County is by participating in the annual Scouting for Food (SFF) drive during the month of November. SFF is one of the largest annual food drives in the metropolitan area normally held every fall prior to Thanksgiving. Local food banks rely on it to stock their shelves for the upcoming holiday months when food demands are the greatest.

This year's NCAC Scouting for Food campaign supporting local food banks and pantries is no different than our previous efforts where Scouts go into the communities, door-to-door, and notify residents of the SFF campaign through the use post-its, door hangers, or other messaging means provided by Council or individual districts on a Saturday and then collect food contributions the following Saturday.

The Patriot District is partnering again this year with the <u>Capital Area Food Bank</u>, the <u>Safeway Foundation</u>, and the <u>Order of the Arrow Amangamek-Wipit Lodge #470</u>. **New for 2023**, a virtual SFF campaign has been added for the Patriot District to supplement our primary door-to-door collection. Access to the online food drive is with <u>www.YouGiveGoods.com</u>, a company whose mission is to provide online charitable giving services, promote community involvement, and inspire social responsibility. *The virtual campaign is not a replacement for your unit's physical participation, but rather a compliment to the overall SFF drive*. It allows scouts to solicit support from family, friends, etc., beyond the district (i.e., family and friends who reside in another state or country).

Our NCAC advertised dates are October 28th for notification and November 4th for collection although collection may occur between October 1st and December 16th. This is the primary method of collecting food donations. Other collection methods that place the Scouts in the community maybe used.

Some units may partner with a local food bank/pantry as part of an established relationship or connection with their Chartering Organization. This is commendable and encouraged. These units can still distribute the YouGiveGoods.com virtual SFF campaign information. However, please note that we are limited by our partner YouGiveGoods.com to only one food bank or pantry per district as their platform is simply not set up for districts to designate multiple recipients. Therefore, all online orders will benefit the Capital Area Food Bank and not your local food bank/pantry.

Our goal is 100%-unit (physical) participation – 54 Units! Many neighborhoods within the district overlap with other scouting units. In order to achieve the widest coverage and 100%-unit participation, units that cannot cover their local neighborhoods are strongly encouraged and respectfully requested to venture out of their comfort zones and volunteer for a different neighborhood. Don't let a lack of familiarity or antipathy prevent you and your unit from participating in the council's largest community service project.

Stay tuned for additional information the closer we approach SFF on important topics such as the distribution of routes, safety, recording unit participation, and reporting requirements.

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BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

- 1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all Questions truthfully and honestly.
- 2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16
- 4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
- 5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
- 6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
- 7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
- 8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
- 9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
- 10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection
